- □ Starting at birth
- □ As an infant and toddler
- □ As a preschooler
- ☐ Kindergarten through High School
- ☐ Up until age 26 years.

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Special Education - Law

Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA)

- Federal Law
- Part C: Early Intervention
 - Birth to Age 3
- · Coordination of Services
- Part B: Special Education
 - 3 years to 21 years

Michigan Mandatory Special Education (MMSE)

- Michigan Law
- Special Education
 - Birth to 26 years
- Eligibility
 - 13 Categories

- No Cost Evaluation
- Established Conditions or 20% delay


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Child Find Responsibility "Child Find" is a legal requirement that schools find all children who have disabilities and who may be entitled to special education services. In Michigan, Child Find covers every child from birth through age 25. The school must evaluate any child that it knows, or suspects may have a disability. Birth to 3 years 1-800-EarlyOn 3 years - 5 years 1-888-320-8384 • K -12 • Local School District's Special Education Director

Either a parent of a child or a public agency may request an initial evaluation when a child is suspected of having a disability.	
A parent MUST consent to the evaluation.	
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False!

- Infants, toddlers, preschools and youth must be determined eligible for special education
- · Eligibility is determined by an evaluation
 - There are 13 Eligibility Categories
 - Some categories require a medical diagnosis as a part of the criteria for eligibility
- Evaluation must determine that the impairment adversely affects a student's educational performance

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Eligibility - 13 Categories

- Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)
- Cognitive Impairment (CI)
- Deaf-Blindness (DB)
- Early Childhood Developmental Delay (ECDD)
- Emotional Impairment (EI)
- Hearing Impairment (HI)
- Other health Impairment (OHI)
- Physical Impairment (PI)

- Severe Multiple Impairment
- · Specific Learning Disability
- Speech and Language Impairment
 (SLI)
- Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI)
- Visual Impairment (VI)



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Medical Diagnosis vs. Special Education Eligibility

- Other Health Impairment
 - Lead Poisoning
 - Attention Deficit Disorder
- Physical Impairment
 - Cerebral Palsy
 - Spina Bifida
- Traumatic Brain Injury
 - Traumatic Brain Injury
- Cognitive Impairment
 - Down's Syndrome
 - Fragile X
 - Fetal Alcohol
- Emotional Impairment
 - Oppositional Defiant Disorder Bipolar Disorder



The Purpose of the Initial Evaluation

- Initial evaluation: required before any special education and related services can be provided to a child.
- Purposes:
 - To see if the child is a "child with a disability," as defined by IDEA
 - To gather information that will help determine the child's educational needs
 - To guide decision making about appropriate educational programming for the child



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Evaluation - Timelines

Early On

- 45 Calendar Days
 - · Starts when referral is received
 - Includes
 - Screening (if applicable)
 - · Initial evaluation
 - Initial Assessments of the child and family
 - Initial Individualized Family Service Plan meeting

Special Education

- · Initial request for evaluation
- Parent Consent: within 10 <u>School Days</u>
- Evaluation, determination of eligibility and write an IEP: within 30 <u>School Days</u>
- Parent Consent to special education programs and services: within 10 <u>School</u> Days
- Implement the IEP: within 15 <u>School Days</u>

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The Purpose of Special Education

Special education is instruction that is specially designed to meet the unique needs of a child with a disability. This means education that is individually developed to address a specific child's needs that result from his or her disability. Ensures:

- Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE)
- In the Least Restrictive Environment (LRE)
- Access to
 - General Education Curriculum
 - Extra Curricular Activities
 - Non-Academic Activities
