We support students who receive special education supports and services (IFSP/IEP) birth to age 26 by fostering cooperation and effective teamwork among those who plan their education. The overall goal is to help students, parents and educators make decisions that improve education outcomes.

Mediation

A FREE neutral mediator leads families and schools through a process to resolve conflict and come to a mutual agreement on a plan to benefit the student and improve outcomes.

Facilitation

We help families and schools navigate complex meetings, stay on task, and make sure all points of view are heard by providing a FREE neutral meeting facilitator.

Mediation and Facilitation Comparison



Mediation:
When you know you disagree.

Facilitation:

When you don't know what you don't know and you do know that you should know, call us, we'll help you.

Both are voluntary processes.

Why Should You Use SEMS FREE Services?

Behavior plan not being implemented as discussed. Disagreement about an independent evaluation for speech therapy.

Personality conflict between Dad and Resource Room Teacher. School wants student placed in a self-contained classroom and family disagrees.

When you don't agree with one another.


Why Should You Use SEMS FREE Services?



School wants family to stop texting teacher at 10pm and wants improved interactions. IEP not being implemented as written and need meeting to discuss improved plan.

School believes student needs specialized instruction but family disagrees.

When you need help finding a solution that is focused on the student.




The Mediator's Role	•
Will Remain neutral Conduct the mediation Ensure that all parties have equal opportunity to express their ideas and thoughts Make sure everyone abides by rules for appropriate conduct Help the parties stay on the topic of their disagreement Guide the participants towards creating an agreement Record the agreement	
Won't - Take sides - Give legal advice - Make a decision - Enforce decision.	



Mediation Agreements are written by the family and school.

The Facilitator's Role



Will

- Receive information about concerns in advance of meeting. Acknowledge/Review agenda understanding and meeting
- guidelines
 Make sure everyone abides by rules for appropriate conduct
- Keep the meeting centered on the student's needs
 Help negotiate disagreements
 Keep the meeting on track and on time

- · Conduct meeting if requested.

- Be a part of the team
- Give legal advice
 Take sides
- Make a decision.


True: Mediators and facilitators are obligated to remain neutral. Advocating for a school or parent could upset the balance between them and make solutions harder to reach.
